

A word from Pastor Ramon Smith



Summary of Central Texas Annual Conference 2023

Grace and Peace,

Saginaw UMC Lay members to the Annual Conference include Sam and Belia Thompson and Rebecca Altizer (Alternate who served in place of Jean James). The Annual Conference began on Sunday, June 4, 2023, with opening worship at 7:00 pm in the Waco Convention Center. The Conference preacher was Rev. Derek Jacobs from the Village UMC (North Texas Annual Conference), and the One Fellowship UMC Mass Choir (Central Texas Conference) provided the worship music for the service.

The theme of the sermon was "It's a New Season." The sermon was inspirational and instructional: Don't live in the past. Focus on the future. The hardships of the past have made us stronger, and we are prepared to walk into the destiny that God has promised.

On Monday, June 5, 2023, the Annual Conference was called to Order by Bishop Ruden Saenz, followed by worship. Bishop Saenz gave his Episcopal Address encouraging us to: "Be Strong, Take Heart, and Hope in the Lord." Our Conference Teachers were Rev. Dr. Aqueelah Ligonde of Valley Stream, NY, and Trey Wince of Oklahoma City, OK. They both work for Ministry Incubators, which helps people launch new ministry ideas outside the church. I will provide a separate summary of the teaching sessions.

Additionally, we voted on disaffiliation matters. The CTC had 38 more churches disaffiliate. Some Oasis Communities have formed as a safe haven for hurting United Methodists whose churches have disaffiliated. And we have already launched and chartered a new United Methodist Congregation with over 100 people and it's name is **REVIVE United Methodist Church** in Azle, TX.

Following the disaffiliation vote, the laity elected two new delegates to the General Conference to replace delegates who could no longer serve. Kevin Walters was elected on the second ballot. Pam Phinney was elected on the third ballot.

On Monday night at the Ordination and Commissioning Service, we commissioned and ordained the largest class of candidates in the last ten years; Rev. Rhonda Chambers was commissioned and is appointed to serve as associate pastor at Saginaw UMC on July 1, 2023. Sarah Boyette was ordained as deacon and will continue to serve at First Hurst United Methodist Church.

On Tuesday morning a memorial service was held to celebrate the lives and ministries of the

clergy, clergy spouses, and Central Texas laity who have died. Next, we voted on three resolutions:

Resolution to Provide Menstrual Products In Support of Creating A US Regional Conference Supporting the Removal of Discriminatory Policies.

All three of the resolutions passed. The resolution "Supporting the Removal of Discriminatory Policies" was passed with an amendment that urged the delegates to General Conference to consider the diverse theological perspectives (progressives, centrists, and traditionalists) in our conference when casting their vote. A fourth resolution was tabled indefinitely.

These votes are aspirational. None of these votes change anything in our Book of Discipline. General Conference is the only body of the church that can do that. Delegates to the general conference will vote their conscience in Charlotte, North Carolina, in the Spring of 2024.

Summary of the Teaching Sessions at Central Texas Annual Conference 2023

Aqueelah and Trey's teaching sessions were entitled: "Know Thy Neighbor Gen Z and the Faith of Emerging Generations." Here is a summary of the sessions.

Why?

Why should we be interested in reaching Generation Z, and what role do we have to play? The conference preacher and the bishop reminded us, "Our young people are the future." Additionally, these young people are our children, grandchildren, and neighbors. This requires us to make strategic decisions today that will enable us to grow the church of tomorrow. Rev. Dr. Aqueelah reminded us of the story of Samuel and Eli. Samuel, the boy, could hear the call of the Lord, but Eli could not. Yet, Eli served as his mentor. Young people may hear God's call to do something new that we cannot hear, but they need mentoring. They need kind of mentors who listen and are empathetic. Unfortunately, we often skip the listening part.

Who is Generation Z? (2023). Another way to consider it is to consider all the kids in pre-kindergarten through college age.

- Ages 4 to 22
- Population 77.9 million
- Spending power 10.7 million
- Differentiators:
 - Diversity (It is the most diverse generation in the history of the US.)
 - 22% Silent Generation
 - 28% Boomers

- 45% Millenial

- Digitally driven
 - Find community through technology
 - Correlation between depression/anxiety to the amount of time spent on social media

Core Values of Gen Z

- 89% of Gen Z believes that mental health is as important as physical health
- 81% of Gen Z buy from brands that support causes they believe in
- Work life should not be severed from their core beliefs

How do we become more curious and better listeners?

When launching a new ministry, we must first start with empathy. We need to listen and be curious. We don't need to assume we know what they need. We must understand the hopes, pain, assumptions, loathes, and loves of the people we are trying to reach. Marketing firms understand the value of this kind of research. This is why you see tire commercials about mental health. Even though tires and mental health have nothing to do with each other, mental health is important to the tire company's target consumer. We must also understand what is essential to the people we are trying to reach.

- Do one on ones. (5 Meetings with 5 People)
- Ask Good questions (how do you feel or tell me about a time....)
- •4 Key Points: How to get interested and curious about people.
 - Purpose (Let them know why you want to meet with them)
 - Exploration (Ask good follow-up questions.... tell me more about...)
 - Exchange (resources/tools) (values/stories ...it should not feel like an interview)
 - Commitment (Who else can I talk to, and what are you willing to do?)

This is Part 4, and last, in a series of articles on church leadership opportunities.

We hope this series of articles has been informative and will help you as members of SUMC identify where your spiritual gifts would be best used. Please reach out to the Pastor or members of the Nominations Committee for more information or to get "plugged in." 1 Corinthians 12:4-7. *Now God gives us many kinds of special abilities, but it is the same Holy Spirit who is the source of them all. There are different kinds of service to God, but it is the same Lord we are serving. There are many ways in which God works in our lives, but it is the same God who does the work in and through all of us who are his. The Holy Spirit displays God's power through each of us as a means of helping the entire church.*

Discernment

The Discernment team is dedicated to helping discern the way the Holy Spirit is calling the church to live and move and be in our community and world. To this end, the basic tasks include: 1) Begin a membership roll clean up when at least 100 names are listed as members who have not attended worship at least 3 times in the previous 18 months; 2) Being mindful of input from the congregation, create, lead and facilitate ministry goals for the church and develop ways to measure progress toward those goals; 3) Create and facilitate congregation-wide conversations around large issue topics facing the church.

This committee is not designated by the Book of Discipline but established by our church for the purposes listed. It follows the same structure as most other committees of three rotating classes of three members each for continuity and to avoid burnout. It reports to the Administrative council, and the chair is designated at the committee's discretion.

Current members include: Ron Mayo (Chair), Judy Scott, Brie Kilgore, James Young, Thomas Buchanan, Belia Thompson, Karen Ranney and Pastor Ramon Smith.

Endowment Committee

While the Finance Committee has the task of resourcing the year-to-year ministry and mission of the church, the Endowment Committee is tasked with resourcing ministry and mission goals outside or just beyond those annual goals. This committee's main tasks are: 1) Oversee contributions made to this fund; 2) Ensure legacy gifts are acknowledged, invested and in line with the UMC social principles and Book of Discipline; 3) Accept requests for disbursement and insure they are used for the intended purpose and do not exceed the limits in the bylaws; 4) Educate members of SUMC regarding opportunities for making legacy gifts.

Church Leadership, cont.

The committee should not have more than nine members divided into three classes for a three -year term. The chairperson is elected by the Nominations Committee. It should also have representation from Finance, Trustees and the Administrative Council Chair. Current members are: Don King (Chair), Sheri Rann, Diane Weaver, Dale Pontius, Ken Sipll, Tim Kret, Gary Schiffner, Rosa Jordan, David Ranney and Pastor Ramon Smith.

Nominations and Leadership Development

This committee elected by the charge conference serves throughout the year to guide the Administrative Council on matters of lay leadership of the congregation. They should be sensitive to the leadership needs and be able to recognize the capabilities, gifts, skills and experience of people in the congregation. In addition, they should work toward offering training opportunities for identified or potential leaders.

Besides those mentioned above, other tasks include: 1) prepare job descriptions for leadership positions; 2) invite potential leaders to serve in those positions; 3) present recommendations to the charge conference. The committee should not exceed nine members, plus the pastor (chair) and the lay leader. All should be members of the local church. Members may include a youth and should include a young adult. Like most others, it is divided into three classes, each elected for a 3-year term. Current members include: Pastor Ramon Smith (chair), Jane Ann Kret, Juanita Jordan (Lay Leader), Jay Beavers, Joan Sipll, Liz Slagle, Dee Griffith, Gloria Doss, Belia Thompson and Jean King.

Saginaw Water Project

This committee is not required by the Book of Discipline but was created as a Holy Focus project in 2017 from our congregations' desire to help those in our community struggling to pay their water bill. The committee partners with the City of Saginaw to identify appropriate candidates who go through a vetting process before funds are transferred to the city on their behalf. This project has been well funded by generous donations made by church members. In 2022, 25 families were assisted with a total of \$6260.56 paid directly to the water department. This year, eight families have been helped, and the need generally increases after July.

Current members of this committee include: Robert Pressler, Juanita Jordan, Rhonda Schiffner, Chuck Kilgore and Caroline Dreese (Youth.) They serve three-year terms in classes of two. Rev. Rhonda Chambers, pastor of caring ministries, will chair this committee by vetting applicants according to the guidelines, assessing the spiritual and material needs of the applicants, and offering pastoral care or a Stephen Minister when appropriate.
